Barons ponder QB woes

"Put it on the boarrrrrrd...yyyesssss!" The words of Baltimore Barons play-by-play voice Hawk Hugglesby resonated up and down the Barons radio network Monday night as the final totals came in and made it clear the team had beaten Flint and gotten back in the TFL win column after four straight defeats.

Two more words resonated in Baltimore and in the mind of Barons head coach Berry Switzer at the same time: quarterback controversy. The Barons won this game over the still-winless Bison despite getting no touchdown passes, and not even any points, out of starting QB Drew Bledsoe, whose early-season funk has now become the sophomore slump he didn't have last season.

Reporters at Switzer's victorious press conference in the media room at the Harbordome couldn't blame the coach for having to consult Webster's Dictionary for a refresher on the term:

Touchdown pass (n): An occurrence in

American-rules football in which the quarterback throws the ball and it is caught be a running back or receiver from the same team, and that player runs with the ball until he (or she) crosses a thick white line extending from sideline to sideline with a small, orange flag in the corner.

The Barons have exactly one of those after six weeks of the 1995 season—by erstwhile backup Trent Dilfer, who accomplished the feat while substituting for Bledsoe during a recent by week.

The trouble was scoring points. The Barons are next-to-last in the TFL with 170, and have scored 40 or more only once—this week.

"If you can't hang half a hundred in this league, you ain't gettin' very far," the coach said, spitting at a reporter's feet while working on a pinch of Skoal. He muttered something about his tobacco brand being the problem since it was recommended to him by Denver Pyles owner Mike Taylor. "Nah," he corrected himself. "The Pyles suck, too. But don't print that."

Switzer then headed off to help Bledsoe into the jacuzzi, dislocated shoulder and all, and to start getting ready to play mighty Marley this week.

"Emmitt Smith, Emmitt Smith, Emmitt Smith," Switzer muttered again. "I even called my wife "Emmitt" a couple of times last week."

Pyles: One for the toilet in '95

All through the summer, as he basked in the afterglow of an underserved Sweeney Bowl championship, Denver owner Mike Taylor wasn't content to merely gloat about the Pyles' miraculous '94 season.

No, that wouldn't do. "The Pyles will win one for the middle finger in '95," Taylor predicted, repeating the mantra for anyone who cared to listen.

Six games into the season, Taylor has learned first-hand the difficulties of duplicating a championship. A raft of ill-conceived

draft choices and a lack of overall intensity has left the Pyles in the Barbarino Division cellar, a 2-4 unit with little hope of even making the playoffs.

Taylor, though, refuses to accept responsibility for the Pyles' woes, choosing instead to finger TFL officials for their failure to produce the league championship trophy in a timely manner.

"Admittedly, not having the T-Rex Trophy as a motivational tool has hurt in the early going," Taylor said Tuesday. "It was supposed to be handed out at the TFL Convention, but intense envy on the part of Commissioner [Scott] Lacy and Commisssioner Emeritus Ken Sain—who total zero Sweeney Bowl titles between them—inspired them to concoct a story blaming the engraver for the unavailability of the trophy.

That Taylor would attempt such an obvious misdirection play is no surprise. For years he has been the TFL's master magician, adroitly spewing rubbish with his mouth so as to draw attention away from the meager exploits of his gridiron unit.

For all their press releases, their inexplicable Sweeney Bowl title, the incessant yammering of their owner, the Pyles still are haunted by one damning statistic: no winning seasons since 1991.

"I think the Pyles' inability to post a winning season goes to the very heart of their inadequacy as a TFL entry," Bagdad's Scott Lacy said. "Mr. Taylor's bid for a second ring, while never actually conceivable, has already been flushed down the toilet that is Pyles football.

"At least he has his annual quest to play .400 football left to entertain him."

Unable to explain the sorry state of the Pyles, Taylor lobbed a final grenade at the

season was foiled when Kansas City's Tamarick Vanover returned a punt for a touchdown in overtime, denying Carney a decisive field goal attempt.

Baltimore's Drew Bledsoe is off to the slowest start for a TFL quarterback since 1991, when Panama City's Jim Everett failed to score touchdown in his first six starts. Everett was traded after his sixth straight pointless outing. Could the same fate befall Bledsoe? . . . Bagdad leads all teams with 167 reserve points. Alaska has the fewest: 29.
