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Nightmare: Barons win

BALTIMORE -- Now it is written; now it is done. Let the horns honk and the celebration detonate in Maryland.

The Baltimore Barons, everybody's most hated team, are the T. Rex winners for 1997: the Sweeney Bowl champions. Baltimore 23, Flint 16.

While others yearn for a league in which luck isn't as strong an influence in determining who wins either games or the championship, Barons owner Steve Katz just yearns for Boston. It's there, at the 1998 convention, that he'll become the first champion to actually have the league's beloved trophy handed to him before his peers.

"Leading by six measly points going into the Monday night game was too much for my nerves," Katz said amid the spraying champagne in the winning lockerroom. "It was the third or fourth game we've won this year and in the playoffs with no points from either one of our running backs.

"Even the pillars of our team, Brett Favre and Antonio Freeman, did barely enough on Saturday. When Favre misfired on two straight attempts at his third touchdown pass before the end of the first half, I got nervous. When he got pulled for the second half, I started worrying big-time."

It took some heroic defense Monday night to hold Flint's Karim Abdul-Jabbar and Ben Coates to but a single point combined, even though Baltimore's Adam Vinatieri mustered

only two extra points himself in New England's victory over Miami.

A tie would have given the championship to Flint on the tiebreaker using reserve points. It was not to be. The fantasy Gods gave Katz the glory this time.

They bestowed up him a glory that such luminaries as Ken Sain and Scott Lacy, who mailed in this season, have yet to see.

For Sain, the suffering continues. Last year, with a team almost the same as Katz's this year, the Test Tubes lost the Sweeney Bowl to a team of lesser lights who had their best games just when they needed to.

This year the Tubes played what looked like themselves in the semifinals -- Katz's Barons team, studded with Favre, Freeman, Mike Alstott and

Adam Vinatieri - and naturally, came up short.

When things had settled down at the post-game press conference, a still champagne-soaked Katz swatted away question after question about the sniping he endured.

"The differences between the accomplishments of last year's Tubes and this year's Barons may have to do more with luck than anything," he said, "but a point-by-point comparison

of the teams isn't very long. "One: The year's Barons won the championship.

"Two: Last year's Tubes didn't. Next question."

Reporters tried to get Katz to admit last year's Tubes were the stronger team.

In addition to those four players, the Experiments also had Terrell Davis starring at running back.

Katz refused comment, proving reporters right.


What about the lucky vs. good debate?

"Being good enough when you need to be is what matters. Next question."

What about being a twoman team?

"You mean Mike Alstott didn't really score 10 touchdowns? Yancey Thigpen wasn't really the best receiver in the AFC, or one of them, the second half of Adam the vear, and Vinatieri didn't really score over 100 points?" Katz shot back. "Let the 13 teams who didn't win cast their stones. We are through being defensive about it," Katz said, with almost no voice, or fingernails, left.

"I liken this situation to when Pat Riley left the Lakers to coach the Knicks and people said sure, anybody could win with Magic and Kareem, now let's see you coach. I guess I'll just have to win next year without all that Packer power." The questioners went on,



incredulous at the Barons' championship, but Katz just enjoyed the moment and then left grinning ear to ear. The T. Rex is coming to Baltimore, where jubilation engulfed the town.

While Baltimore and Flint were playing the lowest scoring game in Sweeney Bowl history, the real excitement took place in the third-place game, where the two best teams during the TFL's regular season did battle.

Dugway, the regular sea-

son champion, defeated Dutch Harbor, the points scoring champion, 52-49.

Both teams had a rare off week in the semifinals, allowing to inferior opponents to advance to the title game.

"Well, all four teams played to their true potential in Week 17," Sain said. "What you saw was the two best teams in the league this year play a great third-place game while the two lucky teams stunk of the Sweeney Bowl with their performances.

"I hear the T. Rex on top of the John Sweeney Trophy asked for a blindfold at halftime of the Sweeney Bowl, so sick he was of their play.

"It's unfortunate that this league is still 75 percent luck and only 25 percent skill. Of course, that's what it is now. If Chris Reidy gets his way, the league will become 100 percent luck and skill will have absolutely nothing to do with the outcome of the games."

The 1990 Arctic Gators? True, Mark Dolan's team did score a TFL low 331 points. But that was a different era, when points were very difficult to come by.


